

Downtown Boca Raton eyes first senior living center

A plan for Boca Raton's first senior living center located in the downtown is making its way through the city's planning conduit.

In fact, the Planning & Zoning Board, on Feb. 22, recommended 3-1 that the project get the green light from the City Council when it comes before that board for final approval.

According to plans filed in City Hall, the Paladin – a Sunrise Senior Living Residence – will, if approved, be built at 855 S. Federal Highway. The nine-story structure will house 234 age-restricted units – 176 designated for independent living, 58 for assisted living – on a 2.26-acre parcel.

The complex will be open to those age 62 and older, plans say. A memo from Sunrise says it operates two existing homes. The average age for residents of one is 68.4 years; the other, 74.1 years.

Retail and dining

The thick folder of documents and maps in the Development Services office says the Paladin will also have retail stores and a 5,000 square foot restaurant. Some 1,500 square feet of that eating spot will be open to the public; the rest will be for members only.

Documents say the area was to be developed as a multi-use facility. The Boca Raton Community Redevelopment Agency

on Jan. 9, 2006, approved a structure for 224 residential units, with 11,000 square feet of office retail space, 6,000 square feet of office space and a four-level garage with 395 parking spots.

A 33,000 square foot building with two

ground level parking lots currently sit on that piece of property location between SE 8th and SE 9th streets. They will be demolished to make way for the Paladin.

DCA says no to prohibition on extension of Riverside, University

Seeing the handwriting, literally, on the Department of Community Affairs Southwest Boca annexation (DCA) wall, the county commission (again by a 4-3 vote) has reaffirmed its approval of the annexation of a southwestern portion of Palm Beach County by Broward County.

Earlier this month commissioners also approved the annexation of 1,949 acres by Broward - but voiced the stipulation that the approval was contingent upon both University Drive and Riverside Drive never being extended across the Hillsboro Canal and into Palm Beach County.

"Traffic would be horrendous," argued Commissioner Burt Aaronson.

Which is precisely why DCA Secretary Thomas G. Pelham said no.

"The Department of Community Affairs does not support legislation that would circumvent the growth management process," Pelham said in a March 14 letter to Rep. Adam Hasner (R-Delray Beach).

plan moving forward

It's Hasner's bill that contains the annexation approval plan to be considered by the state legislature later this year. Hasner had requested the DCA opinion upon learning some southwest Boca Raton residents were angry that his bill didn't contain the road extension prohibitions.

A perpetual prohibition against the road extensions "would not be appropriate and additionally it would create a bad precedent," Pelham said, adding:

"The ability to serve the public with an adequate system of mobility is an important growth management objective."

Annexation discussion only began seriously two years ago soon after landowners representing 1,436 of the 1,949 acres submitted a plan to Palm Beach County for building more than 2,800 homes in the area known locally as the Golden Wedge.

In turn, the City of Parkland subsequently told Palm Beach County that it would want to then annex about 1,500 of those acres into the city. And it's the potential for that kind of growth that in turn wouldn't be possible if University and Riverside drives were then stopped at the post annexation Broward/Palm Beach County line.

The alternative point of view is that those opposing road extensions over the Hillsboro Canal are ignoring that, without extensions, persons in life threatening situations are that much further removed from emergency services.

At it stands now, Hasner's bill is moving forward without any road extension prohibitions.

Boca woman uses CPR to save life

Victoria Matthews stepped in to perform rescue at Mizner Country Club

When Victoria Matthews of Boca Raton joined her friends for a round of golf at Mizner Country Club the morning of Feb. 20, she didn't realize she would save a life that day.

"We were in the golf cart heading for the first tee," said Matthews, 'when we noticed a commotion at the tennis court."

Then, she saw a man lying mo-

Matthews, who learned CPR five or six years ago, but has never used it, ran over to the man and started giving him the life-saving chest compressions.

The man recovered – and is doing so well that he is out of town for a while.

Matthews said she learned CRP when she was a spin instructor at a gymnasium in Atlanta. Spinning, she said, is exercising with a stationery bicycle. But she never used it until that morning when a neighbor's health was on the line.

"It didn't go on for a long time," she said, recalling that after three chest compressions, the man opened his eyes and began to wake up. "By that time, one of the personal trainers was coming with a portable defibrillator, but he had a pulse."

The man she saved, she said, was Levy Katzir, a 75-year-old resident of Mizner Country Club who is "an avid tennis player. He is really in

Boca Raton Community High School NJROTC recently received second place at the States Championship held in Oviedo. This title secured a spot in the National Competition.

Going into the competition with countless trophies and titles, Boca Raton Community High School NJROTC was predicted to leave with another.

And that expectation was recently met when Boca High NJROTC took home second place at the States Championship held in Oviedo.

That title means more than just another tall trophy. The title secured a spot in the National Competition, set for April 13 in Pensacola.

"We all feel pretty excited. Last year we got third place in states and didn't know that we were going to nationals until eight days before," said Eric Reissi, Boca High NJROTC Executive Officer.

"This year the team is a lot stronger than last year. And now we have a secured spot, and we're a lot more confident for nationals."

Last year, the team took home second place at nationals with only eight days of practice.

According to Cadet Commander Larissa Salvador, members started practicing for nationals a week after states.

"Just from the past three years I've learned that you don't ever underestimate the competition," Salvador said.

"We've increased the amount of practice.'

However, the state competition wasn't easy, according to Salvador. More than 30 students spent the day in physical and mental competition from an academic test, uniform inspections, drills, push-ups, situps, and relays.

"Our days started at 5:30 in the morning and went on until 6 at night," she said.

"It was a tight competition. States have proven every year to increase the level of competition. But overall the team put a lot of work into it, and I think the title was well deserved."

Besides another title, Salvador believes self discipline was gained.

"Going on these trips and staying with kids in a bus for four hours teaches us self discipline and how to get along with people. Each person has a different personality and we learned how to adapt to different personalities," she said.



Developing brand names with trademarks

Editor's Note: This is part one of a three-part series.

The world is full of goods, products and services that are constantly being marketed to us in many types of ways. The goal of a business person who has something to sell is to make the name of your product or service affixed to your customer's brain and on their mind 24 hours a day, seven days a week.

Close your eyes and think coffee. Do you think of Starbucks or Dunkin Donuts? Now think hamburgers. Do you think of Mc-Donalds, Burger King or Wendy's? What about computers?

Do you think of IBM, Hewlett Packard, Compaq, or Dell? The examples used are names of companies that are registered trademarks but they also all have products or services that are equally well known and protected.

Federal Law is the primary law of the land for trademarks and filing your mark with the U.S. Patent and Trademark Office is the route to go if you want the maximum protection.

The federal statute for this body of law is the The Lanham Act that is Title 15, Chapter 22 of the United Stated Code. Specifically, this Act prohibits a number of activities, including trademark infringement, trademark dilution and false advertising.

Named for Representative Fritz G. Lanham of Texas, the Act was could be specific logos or sym-

passed on July 5th 1946 and signed into law by President Harry Truman taking effect one year from its enactment, July 5th, 1947.

Trademarks, Servicemarks and Tradenames are primarily used by businesses to develop a brand name so that the public will in turn identify their specific product, service or company in a more favorable way over any other competitor.

By definition, a trademark is associated with a specific product, a service mark with a specific service and a trade name with a company

The critical issue to be aware of when attempting to register your mark is whether or not the mark you are looking to protect is likely to cause confusion, mistake, or deceive the public into thinking you are something or someone that has already been established for a same or similar purpose.

Knowing whether or not your mark is or is not eligible for registration is the next issue. Trademarks, Servicemarks and Tradenames can be many types of

They can be suggestive or evocative words such as Slim-Fast and Travelocity.

They can be arbitrary made-up words such as Xerox, Kleenex and

They can also be words that are surprising or unexpected in the context of their use such as Lexus, the car company, or ebay, the online auctioneer. Finally marks

bols such as the Nike swoosh, the Playboy bunny or the Coca Cola

As a rule of thumb, marks that describe a specific identifier of a product, marks based upon a specific location or marks based on a specific name, are not eligible for trademark protection.

However, if the business can demonstrate public awareness of the mark through advertising, product sales or other means, then it is arguable that the business has developed a "secondary meaning" and may be eligible for protection There are many famous examples of this which include: Ben & Jerry's, Ralph Lauren, Trump, Elvis, Mutual of Omaha, New York Stock Exchange, "Live Strong" (Lance Armstrong), and "We do chicken right" (KFC).

Developing the mark is only the beginning of the process.

In the next issue, I will address the specifics on registration and what other issues you must be aware of when proceeding with trademarks.

Klein wants to block Medicaid reimbursement changes

U.S. Rep. Ron Klein (D-22) has introduced legislation that would block proposed changes to the Medicaid reimbursement system.

The proposed changes that Klein wants to block would "financially devastate" Florida hospitals resulting in a \$4.6 billion cut in Medicaid payments over a five-year period, he said.

District 22 hospitals alone would stand to lose \$14.8 million alone, said Klein. U.S. Rep. Ileana Ros-Lehtinen (D-18) joined him in introducing the bill.

The Klein and Ros-Lehtinen's bill would place a two-year moratorium on the proposed rule. The bill is a companion to bill S.787 that Senator Mel Martinez (FL)

introduced earlier this month.

'This rule could effectively reverse successful efforts by Governor Jeb Bush and other state leaders in Florida to offset the cost of indigent health care," said Klein. "It is disappointing that this administration is putting an even greater burden on our hospitals that must treat everyone who comes into the emergency room. Our bill would suspend this proposed change to the Medicaid reimbursement process. It is simply unfair to punish our local hospitals that are barely able to make ends meet as it is, because of the federal government's reckless spending habits."

The Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services (CMS) recently proposed capping payments to

hospitals by limiting payments to public and publicly supported providers and narrowing funding sources available to finance Medicaid expenditures. The new rule would uniquely impact Florida because it would effectively eliminate the Florida's Low Income Pool (LIP) program, which CMS recently approved as an innovative federal waiver.

Klein said his two-year moratorium on the ruling would provide ample time to examine the impact that the proposed CMS ruling would have on Florida and other states, "especially those states with Medicaid and State Children's Health Insurance Programs (SCHIP)."

County teachers make a trek to Tallahassee

Raising teacher salaries has been a call among teachers

However, some teachers recently went straight to the source- Tallahassee.

More money for teachers statewide was the main request of a group of county teachers that made a recent trek to Tallahassee.

"We went to make sure that legislators pursue our concerns," said Palm Beach County Teachers Association (CTA) President Theo Harris.

Other county teachers and district officials joined Harris during Palm Beach County Days, a threeday event designated for county school officials to lobby for educational needs in Tallahassee. County educators travel to Tallahassee every year to lobby for education issues and funding, Harris said.

"We're making sure that they're

fully funding education the way it should be funded," Harris said.

Harris said the main issues county teachers lobbied for included changing the Special Teachers Are Rewarded (STAR) plan and raising teacher salaries.

"One of the issues we lobbied for was to put money designated for the STAR plan in teacher salaries instead of a pay for performance plan," Harris said.

He added that the county teachers also went one step further in efforts to modify the STAR plan.

"The Senate and the House both have committees that met on STAR. And they both have bills that hopefully will devise something workable for everybody." Harris said. "Additionally, we're going to file a bill that will refine the proviso and put it back into the Department of Education so they can devise something new," he said.

Vern Pickup-Crawford, legislative consultant for the School District of Palm Beach County, said

"We're actively trying to get legislation to help us get funding and instructional support for career academies," said Crawford.

In fact, a bill came out of the Senate Education Committee this past week "that makes a big step for career academies." That bill S1232 was filed by the Senate and titled Career & Professional Education. The bills states, "creates the Florida Career & Professional Education Act for purpose of improving academic performance and responds to state's workforce needs; requires that district school boards develop strategic plans to address and meet local and regional workforce needs; provides for coordination between career and professional academies and industry."

Additional, STAR was on the agenda, Pickup-Crawford added.

"For STAR we asked for two things. One was to give the district an extended time for the current year and Palm Beach County greater flexibility on the current plan. The second is for next year, allowing flexibility to come up with our own plan that's geared towards increasing student performance," he said.

For this issue, a bill was introduced by the Senate entitled S1226 C1 Compensation for District School Board Employees. The bill states, "establishes Merit Award Program for Instructional Personnel & School-Based administrators; requires that district school board adopt Merit Award Program plan in order to receive funding under program; provides for reversion of funds that are not distributed when district or charter school chooses not to adopt plan; provides procedure for resolving impasse regarding dispute involving said program."



The Dow disappoints, lacks the wow

In mid-2000 I bought 72 shares of Dow Chemical at about \$40 a share for about \$3,000 (was this company really started by a Mr. Dow?). And as you recommended, I reinvested all the dividends and now have 91.335 shares of Dow Chemical trading about \$43. I am disappointed that the stock has not done better especially considering that the market has done so well in the past four or five years. The stock is now trading just about two points less than what I paid for my original 72 shares. Do you think I should sell my Dow Chemical and invest in another stock that has better potential? Or should I continue to hold Dow Chemical and be patient? And if you think I should buy more Dow Chemical I have about \$2,500 that I could invest for my Individual Retirement Account this year.

E.R. Joliet, Ill.

Dear E.R.: Yes, it was founded by Mr. Dow!

In 1898 Herbert H. Dow built the 2 percent to \$49.8 commercial bleach manufacturing facility in the U.S.

Today Dow is nothing like the company Herbie built. Dow makes some of the most important stinky chemicals, plastic, surfactants, polycarbonates, films, solvents, latexes, monomers, natural gas liquids, sodas, resins and epoxies allowed to exist in the cosmos. And there are some of these stinky chemicals in everything we touch: from the bristles on your toothbrush, to the jumbo jets that land at Kennedy, to the bed in which you sleep, to your baby's play toys, to missiles shot from an F-14.

While Dow's earnings and revenues have doubled since 2000, the shares have yet to exceed their high price of \$47.60 of seven years ago. In fact, share appreciation over the next few years looks about as exciting as watching a Japanese Kabuki dance.

Earnings for this year are expected to come in at \$4.15 versus \$4.25 for 2006 while 2007 revenues will probably grow less than

billion. In fact, during the coming years Value Line, Morningstar, Merrill Lynch and Credit Suisse figure Dow's revenues will be flat as pizza crust and that net profit margins will de-

cline from their recent 14.5 percent to 13 percent by 2010-2011.

The \$1.50 dividend (may be raised to \$1.60 soon) provides an attractive 3.5 percent yield, which may be among the few positive comments I can make about your 91.335 shares of Dow.

Dow's blue-blood management at its Midland, Mich., home port are a few eggs short of a dozen. I'm disappointed that these highfalutin fellas who reside in richly furbished, imposing executive offices, can't generate enough enthusiasm to nudge Dow shares higher. I'm also disappointed that Dow's highly compensated and

Dow's 8.8 percent revenue growth is much lower than the industry average, gross margins are almost half the industry average of 26.1 percent and Dow is less profitable than its peers.

So perhaps it's time for a collective emetic of the Dow leadership, the cost of which would gladly be borne by most shareholders. Competitors like Bayer, Total, BASF and DuPont have superior numbers a result of evidently better management.

But I recommend that you continue to hold your 91.335 shares

sweetly perked of Dow even though share price, revenues and earnings are stuck in a rut and the muck.

> Because Dow is vulnerable, poorly managed and trades at lower multiples than its peers I'm hearing whispered gossip of a private equity buyout.

No doubt management will be happy to glad-hand scores of millions of dollars to Wall Streets advisers, who like sharks, segue into a "greeding" frenzy when they smell blood.

And the backroom wheeling and deal making between Dow management and private bankers is probably in process as you read this.

So if Dow is bought by a consortium of filthy rich bankers, you have a potential gain of 16 to 18 points, making your initial purchase quite profitable.

The company has almost \$10 billion in earnings and cash flow; attractive green to placate the covert rulers of the world - Blackstone Capital, Kohlberg, Kravis & Roberts and the Carlyle Group. The share price I'm hearing from an acquaintance, a regulator for the New York "Schlock" Exchange, is between \$59 and \$61 a share. And considering the source of this information I'd say that \$60 is an accurate number.

I can't tell you this is a fait accompli. It could be a year before it happens but I feel strongly enough about my source to recommend that you purchase 59 more shares and increase your total to 150 shares. There's a 60 percent degree of probability that my source is accurate and an average 17-point gain in share price represents a 40 percent return on your investment. However if I'm wrong there's little downside peril from the current price so the low risk may be worth the potentially high reward.

Q: I had the same divorce awyer, and forensic accoun-

tant, during the year and half that my case has been pending. My case is complicated with tug of war over the custody of our children. My husband wants half the overnights, just to save child support.

We are also fighting over the value of his business, the amount of alimony, the rights to our art collection (he wants it all) and many lesser matters. The case is set for trial some time during April. I'll know the date after a court hearing next veek.

A month ago, my lawyer and had a falling out. I asked her to proceed in a way that she felt was not supported by the aw and might be unethical, and she refused. I fired her. I etained a new lawyer.

Two days later, I got an orler setting the trial date. My new lawyer has now moved for continuance; that motion s also set for a hearing next week. He says that if we do not get a continuance, he might move to withdraw, as he would not have enough time to prepare the case.

Now I'm between a rock and hard place.

My husband's attorney is upposed to be one of the best (and nastiest) in Palm Beach County. What should I do? What do you think that the udge is going to do?

A: The judge has a numper of choices. He can grant or deny the motion to continue. This might depend on a number of factors including the number of cases on his docket, whether or not the trial had been continued before, and by which side.

Although the judge would never admit it, the decision nay depend on his relationship with your attorney or the other ittorney.

Your new lawyer may have existing trials scheduled for April, which might help win the

motion for continuance. Judges generally honor lawyer's vacation plans, but not yours.

Whichever decision the judge makes on the continuance will withstand an appeal because, either way, his decision will be within the judge's judicial discretion. The fact that the circumstances arose because you fired your original attorney does not give you great grounds to complain about the effect of that act on your trial readiness.

Your new lawyer may or may not be allowed to withdraw from the case at this late time. When the new lawyer took the case there was a pending trial notice on file and he or she should have known that the case might be set at any time. If your new attorney is allowed to withdraw, the judge might force you to trial without an attorney.

Perhaps you, your new attorney and your forensic accountant should immediately schedule a lengthy conference to completely go over the case and discuss trial preparation. Your new counsel may feel more comfortable after such a meeting.

You might also consider offering your new counsel a financial bonus to remain in the case, as it will probably be a lot less expensive then trying to be your own lawyer.





FAU gears up for final home tourney

The final major home tournament of the season might be the toughest one for the Florida Atlantic University softball team, as the Owls (14-10, 0-3 Sun Belt) take on Quinnipiac, Michigan State, Texas A&M and Rutgers in the Parents Weekend Tournament, which starts Friday. Massachusetts will also participate in the event.

Texas A&M is the headliner, as the Aggies are ranked fourth in the nation and are 21-2 overall this season.

"We've got a couple of really good teams coming in this weekend," FAU coach Joan Joyce said. "Those will be huge games for us. Obviously we have to be ready this weekend. I guess I have to be optimistic this weekend that our bats will be active this weekend, but they haven't been working so far."

FAU lost three of its top four hitters from last season - Shauna Corso, Jessica Sachs, and Danielle Arriaga - and Joyce still hasn't found a way to replace the lost offensive production. She's tried different combinations at the top of the order, but it hasn't worked.

"Part of our problem is we've scored just one run in the first inning all year," Joyce

"Our 1 and 2 hitters are not getting on base, and that's our speed. So it's creating a huge problem right off the bat."

Add to it the fact that one of the key seniors who was supposed to lead the Owls, Jenna Lopez, has gone from a hitting .302 last year to just .156 this year, and you begin to understand why the Owls have hit just .242 as a team this year.

The other senior in the lineup, Mandie Fishback, has done her share to try and pick up the slack.

Joyce said Fishback has "carried the load all year" by hitting .338 (second on the team) with one home run and a team-leading 15 RBIs.

When asked what the reason has been for her success this year, Fishback said, "I don't know. I think I'm relaxed up there, having fun, enjoying my last season."

The Owls' leading hitter has been a bit of a surprise this year, since junior Lauren Crandall hit just .198 in 38 games last year. This season, Crandall is hitting a robust .359 with 8 RBIs.
